




Irish co-captain George Kunz, playing his last game in ND stadium today, discusses the role of an offensive right tackle on page 6.

Jacques Returns

Today's Sports Parade is written by James F. Cour of UPI's Far West Division.

NEW YORK (UPI)-Jacques Plante insisted he still was good enough to play in New York. The Rangers said he wasn't. They won the argument.

This one-sided discussion took place at the tailend of the 1964-65 season, and as a consequence of it an unhappy Plante was shipped by the Rangers to their Baltimore farm in the American Hockey League.

It took almost four years, but Plante evened the score at Madison Square Garden Wednesday night when he came into the game as the third St. Louis goaltender and carried the Blues to a 3-1 National Hockey League victory over New York.

Plante's very appearance in the contest came under unusual circumstances. Glenn Hall started in the St. Louis goal, while Jacques, dressed in street clothes, was high in the stands in a television booth preparing to go on the show between periods. But with the game barely two minutes old, Hall was evicted with a 10-minute and game misconduct for making what he later termed "some rather rash statements" to referee Vern Buffey.

Rookie Robbie Irons made his NHL debut in place of Hall, but a puck caught him on the ankle during his warmup stint, and he was removed three minutes later.

For the final 55 minutes of the game he was unbeatable, turning back all 21 shots sent his way. It was pleasant vindication for the 39-year-old veteran, who had retired for three years after his demotion by the Rangers.

"There wasn't special satisfaction in beating the Rangers," said the generous hero. "Just to beat any team from the East is an accomplishment."

Vic Hadfield scored the only Ranger goal just a minute and 16 seconds after the game started with a 65-foot bullet that dipped by Hall. But Bill McCreary evened the score six minutes later and Ron Shock got the winner on a second period power play.

Plante, who had two shutouts in eight previous starts, felt that starting the game in the television booth was beneficial to him.

"I was relaxing up there, only worrying about making notes for the show," he said. "If you sit on the bench, even if you're not playing, you don't know when you'll get called in and you're always tense.'

Plante decided to return to hockey earlier this year when his wife's health improved. He had worked as a salesman during his 'retirement" and so had to get himself back into shape.

"I did two hours of physical exercise every day for two months,"

he said. "I rode a still bike 15 miles a day and played ping pong for an hour. No running."

Plante said he spoke to new Ranger coach Boom Boom Geoffrion during the summer and that his former teammate was interested in having him back in New York.

"But the next day I got picked up by St. Louis," he said.

### **Irish Offense** Leads Nation

NEW YORK (UPI)-For one game at least, Notre Dame didn't miss Terry Hanratty at all.

With Hanratty on the sidelines last week, sophomore Joe Theisman took over the Irish attack and piled up 550 yards against Pittsburgh in a 56-7 rout to enable Notre Dame to take over the national lead in total offense.

The Irish rolled up the big total even though Coach Ara Parseghian, enjoying a 49-0 halftime lead, had the Irish stay on the ground throughout the second half when they didn't throw a pass.

Notre Dame now leads with an average of 521.6 yards per game while Houston is second at 518.6 and Yale is third at 474.7.

Notre Dame, which plays Georgia Tech this Saturday, winds up its season Nov. 30 against Southern Californiaand that may be the game in which the Irish will miss Hanratty, who's out for the year with a knee injury.

# 'Eleven Prolific Men'Top Two

There is something reassuring about large numbers. Getty and Hughes know they couldn't count their money even if they hired people to do it for them. LBJ knows he has plenty of soldiers to win the war in Viet Nam, if only he used them all at once. And Ara Parseghian can get happily lost in the bushels of figures totalled up by his fantastic offense.

The "Eleven Prolific Men" have run up and down various fields for over two miles in yardage. They have already broken four records, and have a shot at a whopping fifteen more. But, as even a Science major can tell you, the line makes the offense go, and blocking makes the line work.

One man who helps the Notre Dame offensive line do its job is co-captain George Kunz. From his vantage point at right tackle, the 6ft. 4in., 240 lb. senior helps secure for Irish ballcarriers safe passage into the opposing

secondary, and makes sure that whoever is slinging the ball gets plenty of time to get his job done.

The view from the stands consists many times of a tangled mass of players pushing and shoving, then magically producing a hole. But there is nothing magical about good blocking. It takes both the knowledge of who to block, and the skill to put him out of the way

Even on a fairly simple play, such as an off-tackle plunge, blocking assignments can cause problems. "Against an 'Oklahoma' defense with its five-man line, blocking is man-on-man," according to Kunz. "It's asking too much of an offensive lineman to take his man one particular way. We just try to have him move his man anywhere he can." If, at the line of scrimmage, the defense should shift into a six-man line, the blockers must compensate. "If the defense, say, brings a linebacker on to the line, that means that he has moved out of someone else's area.'

One of the best looking plays in the Notre Dame offensive arsenal is the "inside reverse", where the fake goes one way,

then the ballcarrier cuts back against the flow. "We try to simplify blocking as much as we can on this type of play", says George. "It's up to the guards to get on the ball and move, though sometimes the tackle pulls. On some plays we can have a guard run a fake pull to get a linebacker out of the way. Important in all the plays is the faking in the backfield. In fact, many of our plays just wouldn't work without that good faking."

The "bread-and-butter" end sweep and the option play can be run in different ways. "If the defensive lineman is on your inside shoulder, you have the perfect situation. And even if he sets up to your outside, you can leave him and get another man further inside. By sliding down one man in that position, we can have a halfback take care of the last outside man. On an option play, the tight end may want to block down on the defensive tackle, leaving the isolated end set up for the quarterback-halfback fake."

A good share of the offensive records come from the passing attack. And the sight of Terry Hanratty standing back and carefully picking out the best target is a sure sign that those 250 lb. defensive tackles are just not getting in. "Pass blocking changes according to your individual opponent," states Kunz. "If he is big and hard-charging, the chances are he is not too agile. Then I try to hit low and cut his legs out from under him. But if he's the type who likes to 'hand fight' and then move around, I concentrate on keeping him in front of me." The "blitz" puts the real heat

on the offensive line. "If the defensive team shoots their linebackers on a blitz, we know that there are going to be some pass receivers open somewhere. We don't try to knock two or three men down at once, but we feel that if we can keep out the men assigned to us, the quarterback will have time to hit the open man."

The Notre Dame offensive attack has succeeded this year because some exceptionally skilled men have learned to work together in the all-important unit. Tight end Jim Winegardner is a true specialist: big enough a 6ft. 4in., 225 lbs. to handle a defensive tackle, yet agile enough to grab 14 passes for 177 yards. Guards Larry DiNardo, Ed Tuck, and Tom McKinley average 6ft. 2in., 240 lbs. but possess the speed necessary for leading sweeps. Kunz and Jim Reilly hold down the tackle spots while Mike Oriard has won the center job from Tim Monty. Oriard, like Kunz a converted tight end, came to Notre Dame without scholarship, winning a place as a "walk-on".

Success on the line comes also from knowing your teammate's moves as well as the defensive man's. Larry DiNardo-Jim Reilly, and Kunz-McKinley have developed into excellent guard-tackle units. Expains Kunz, "If you get to know your partner's moves, then you can be sure exactly how much responsibility you must take in a given situation."

Today take a good look at George Kunz and his mates on the offensive line. They'll be working hard to make it a pleasant afternoon for Theismann and Co., and they'll be making a complicated collegiate offense look beautifully simple.
