The Megaphone Trophy is awarded each year to the winner of the football game between the University of Notre Dame and Michigan State University. It was introduced in 1988.^[1] Design specifications can be found at gallery section.

The Notre Dame side of the trophy is green, while the Michigan State side is blue. The trophy includes many great games, such as The Game of the Century, arguably the greatest college football game ever played. Notre Dame currently leads the trophy series 21-26-1 and the all-time series 45-26-1.

Recent Games

After an 8-0 series run by Notre Dame from 1987 to 1994, tying the series win streak set by Michigan State between 1955 and 1961 (they didn't meet in 1958), Michigan State won four games in a row. Only USC and Michigan have also defeated Notre Dame in eight consecutive meetings, and only USC has done it in consecutive years (2002-2009). From 2003 to 2007 the opponent won on the other team's home field, most recently with Michigan State winning a double overtime 44-41 victory in 2005. Notre Dame pulled out a thrilling come from behind 46-37 victory in East Lansing in 2006. The trend continued in 2007 for Michigan State under new head coach Mark Dantonio who defeated the Fighting Irish 31-14, recording MSU's sixth straight victory in South Bend. On September 20, 2008, MSU defeated Notre Dame 23-7 in East Lansing, ending the series "jinx" of both teams always losing on their home fields since 2001. Notre Dame returned the favor the following year by defeating MSU at home. The 2010 meeting proved to be one of the most exciting finishes to the start of the college football season. A back and forth battle the entire game, Notre Dame took the lead in overtime off of a field goal. After Spartan quarterback Kirk Cousins was sacked on third down, Michigan State lined up for a field goal to tie the game at 31. Michigan State faked the field goal, and Aaron Bates, the holder, tossed a game-winning touchdown pass to Charlie Gaetz to win it 34-31 for the Spartans.

Notre Dame leads the all time series, 45 wins to 28, with one tie game.^[1] Michigan State victories are shaded in blue, Notre Dame victories are shaded in green, and the games are shaded gray.
