*In September, of 1971, Frank Leahy, from his hospital bed in Portland, Oregon, sent the following telegram to the University of Notre Dame where his former national championship players were gathered in reunion.*

Dear Lads and your Fortunate Brides,

Words cannot adequately express the depth of my sadness over not being with you during the most unique gathering in athletic history. Four National Championship Teams together after 28 years, which proves conclusively your love for each other and Notre Dame. Never lose contact with that famous lady who reigns so serenely over our beautiful campus. Give her a chance not to forget you by asking assistance when necessary. She stands ready and willing to reciprocate for your unsurpassed representation during and since graduation.

The privilege of attending Notre Dame has given you an enviable mark of distinction. People everywhere expect more from you because you are a Notre Dame man, because you were a Notre Dame team, and at all times you have and will continue to measure up. While attending our Mother's School you had indelibly inscribed in your minds and hearts certain qualities that set you apart and above most others. Thank God you are cognizant of the awesome monumental challenge and responsibility.

You men are endowed with the qualities that forged our nation into greatness. Notre Dame leadership is more important now than ever before. You and others like you are in a position to restore America to a position of pride, power, prestige, and popularity. You have learned many invaluable lessons at Notre Dame, especially the realization that games can never be won, character cannot be developed, that nothing of everlasting value can be achieved without desire, hard work, loyalty, self discipline and deprivation.
