

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EDUCATION INSTITUTE PLANNED

An institute to develop and coordinate Notre Dame's academic, research and service programs in the professional field of education is being established and will become fully operative next fall. Signifying a total institutional commitment to education, the Institute for Studies in Education will be headed by Rev. Neil G. McCluskey, S. J., who will have the title of dean-director. The Institute will encompass several entities including master's and doctoral degree program in education at Notre Dame, undergraduate teacher education to be centered at Saint Mary's College, the academic year and summer high school teacher training institutes, the Office for Educational Research and the University Counseling Center. The charter and statutes of the new institute are expected to be approved by the Academic Council in the near future.

SENIORS SELECT SENATOR McCARTHY

Senator Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota will be honored as the Senior Class Fellow during a visit to the campus March 5-6. The Democratic legislator will deliver one formal address, take part in several seminars and visit informally with Notre Dame students. Patterned after Yale's Chubb Fellowship, the Senior Fellow Program replaces the Patriotism Award made in earlier years by the senior class.

NAME BIOLOGY

DEPARTMENT CHAIRMAN

Dr. Paul P. Weinstein, chief of the parasitic diseases laboratory of the National Institutes of Health, has been appointed professor of biology and chairman of the department at Notre Dame. He had been associated with the NIH laboratory since receiving his doctorate from The Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health in 1949. His professional specialty is the physiology and biochemistry of parasites, a field closely related to several research projects

currently underway in the College of Science.

THE UNIVERSITY-AT-LARGE

Commitments to Notre Dame's SUMMA Program now total \$40,332,675 or about 78% of the five-year, \$52 million goal. Cities which have reached or surpassed their quotas include Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Atlanta, Louisville, Youngstown, Columbus, Pitts-burgh, New Orleans, Tulsa, San Francisco, Hartford and Indianapolis.
