Notre Dame, Ind., June 16 --- A statuette of the Virgin Mary has been placed atop the 570-foot antenna of WNDU-TV, the new television station to be operated by the University of Notre Dame. The UHF station, which is affiliated with the NBC Television Network, will begin operations by mid-summer.

Rev. Edmund P. Joyce, C.S.C., executive vice president of Notre Dame, recently blessed the statuette just before it was mounted on the top section of the TV tower and hoisted skyward. Among those present at the ceremony were Bernard Barth, vice president and general manager of WNDU-TV, and George Smith, the station's chief engineer, who suggested placing a figure of Our Lady atop the tower.

The 18-inch statuette is a replica of the figure of the Blessed Virgin which overlooks the 1,700 acre Notre Dame campus from the Administration Building's Golden Dome. Made of aluminum and contemporary in design, it was executed by Robert Zale, Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, who just completed his

junior year in Notre Dame's College of Arts and Letters. The aluminum

figure has been anodized to protect it from the elements.

Studios and offices for WNDU-TV are nearing completion on the

Notre Dame campus. Its transmitter and tower are situated south of the

city of South Bend. The station will be formally dedicated in the Fall.

Notre Dame, Ind., June 17 --- The University of Notre Dame today announced it is conducting a self-study of its College of Engineering to determine the type of engineering education most likely to develop not only the student's professional competence but also those attributes which would prepare him for leadership in other areas of life. The study, which will continue through May, 1956, has been made possible by a \$35,000 grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York.

Among the general subjects to be explored are the proportion of liberal arts courses to technical courses in the engineering curriculum; the relationship between the physical sciences and engineering subjects in the course of studies; and the proper balance between general engineering education and specialization at the undergraduate level.

Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., president of Notre Dame, has appointed a Self Study Committee headed by Dr. Ernest J. Wilhelm, associate professor of chemical engineering. Other committee members are Dr. Harold Ellithorn, professor of electrical engineering; LeRoy Graves, associate professor of civil engineering; and Harold Foecke, assistant professor of electrical engineering. Dean Karl Schoenherr and Rev. Philip S. Moore, C.S.C., vice president for academic affairs at the University, are ex officio committee members.

Participating in the self study and representing Notre Dame's College of Arts and Letters and College of Science on sub-committees are Rev. Joseph Haley, C.S.C., assistant professor of religion; Dr. James Danehy, assistant professor in the General Program of Liberal Education; Dr. Norman Haaser, assistant professor of mathematics; and Dr. Charles Mullin, associate professor of physics. .

At the outset, the committee is studying and evaluating existing literature on engineering education. All of Notre Dame's 1955 engineering graduates were asked to complete a detailed questionnaire. Faculty members and alumni of the College of Engineering also will be asked to give their views on the curriculum and facilities of the engineering school.

Committee members also will consult with other educators and industrial executives as well as visit other engineering schools. Their report is expected to point the way to an integrated program which will provide a truly liberal education in all phases of engineering education at Notre Dame.

Notre Dame, Ind., June 19 ---- Mediocrity in study is no more a fitting service of God than mediocre prayer, Rev. Thomas T. McAvoy, C.S.C., head of the history department at the University of Notre Dame, declared here this morning (Sunday).

Father McAvoy preached the sermon at a Solemn High Mass in Sacred Heart Church on the campus marking the formal opening of Notre Dame's summer session. Approximately 800 of the 1,350 summer students are teaching Sisters who are studying for a dvanced degrees at the University.

Occasionally, Father McAvoy said, it is suggested even among religious persons that "moderate learning and mediocre attainments are a better service of God and the Church than the perfection of the deep and learned scholar. Sometimes," he continued, "pious attitudes and moral goodness are praised as worthy substitutes for perfection in study."

The Notre Dame historian conceded that "a correct mind and a good life are indeed indispensable characteristics of a good religious student," but he emphasized that "they are not substitutes for real learning or for

scientific perfection. Indeed," he said, "religious men and women who offer good intentions and extra prayers as substitutes for scholarly work have forgotten the Gospel parable of the talents. They have forgotten that the Master took away even the one talent from the profitless servant." Father McAvoy condemned the "new vogue of mediocrity in intellectual matters" which holds that "the student need not really learn the deeper truths, the hard facts or the eternal rules so long as he can live in harmony and prosperity" with his neighbors. "Catholic Education in the United States will betray its Christian heritage," Father McAvoy shid, "if it accepts this medicerity as its goal even if it adds to that mediocrity all the prayers and pious feelings of the assembled teachers and students."

fold," Father O'Brien reminded his listeners that Our Lord appeals to His followers in all the ages "to strive constantly to extend His kingdom among the souls of men and to bring to all the full deposit of divine truth."

As members of the Mystical Body of Christ, we must share the great stream of supernatural life with those who have not received the gift of faith, Father O'Brien asserted.
