Notre Dame, Ind., Dec. 1 --- Twelve members of the Congregation of Holy Cross, including eight bishops and the Superior General, are attending sessions of the Second Vatican Council convened by Pope John XXIII.

In addition to the prelates and the head of the community, who are Council Fathers with the right to speak and vote, two priests of the Congregation are serving as consultants, and a Holy Cross seminarian is using a newlydeveloped Latin shorthand to help record the historic proceedings.

Of the Holy Cross representatives present for the ecumenical council, seven are Americans, four are Canadians, and one is a native of East Pakistan. Six of them are University of Notre Dame graduates, and two of the prelates have been awarded honorary doctorates by the University.

Archbishop Graner is the ranking prelate among members of the Congregation of Holy Cross participating in the Council. He has been appointed by the Holy Father to serve on the Commission on the Missions. Ten Commissions with twenty-four members each have been created to assist the Council in its work. Eighty of the Commissions' members were appointed by the Pope, and 160 were elected by the 2,600 Council Fathers.

A native of Franklin, Pa., Archbishop Graner is a 1924 Notre Dame graduate with an honorary Doctor of Laws degree awarded in 1947. The veteran missionary was ordained to the priesthood in 1928, was consecrated a bishop in 1947 and became the first Archbishop of Dacca in 1950.

Bishop Mendez, born in Chicago, Ill., was graduated from Notre Dame in 1931 and was ordained four years later. He served for many years in the Texas missions and later as a faculty member and official at Notre Dame. He was elevated to the hierarchy in 1960.

A missionary in East Pakistan and Uganda virtually all his priestly

life, Bishop McCauley is a native of Council Bluffs, Ia. He received a liberal arts degree at Notre Dame in 1930, was ordained to the priesthood in 1934, and became a bishop in 1961.

The Council Fathers elected Bishop McGrath to the Theological Commission. Born in Ancon, The Canal Zone, the future bishop entered Notre Dame as a layman, graduating in 1945. He was ordained in 1949 and later received advance degrees in theology in Paris and Rome. He was dean of the theological faculty at the Catholic University of Chile in Santiago when he was elevated to the hierarchy at the age of thirty-seven in 1961.

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Three of the prelates participating in the Second Vatican Council --Bishops Cousineau, Larose and Choquet -- are members of the Holy Cross Fathers' Canadian Province. Bishop Cousineau, former Superior General of the Congregation of Holy Cross, had the honor of officially proposing to the Council that the name of Saint Joseph be included in the Canon of the Mass, a step already promulgated by the Holy Father. Bishop Cousineau received an honorary doctorate from Notre Dame in 1952.

Bishop Ganguly completes the list of Holy Cross representatives among the hierarchy at the ecumenical council sessions. Born in Hashnabad, East Pakistan, he was ordained a diocesan priest in 1946. He earned a master's degree and doctorate at Notre Dame in 1949 and 1951 respectively. While in America, he decided to enter the Congregation of Holy Cross. After completing a year's novitiate, he returned to East Pakistan, becoming Auxiliary Bishop of Dacca in 1960.

Father Lalande, elected Superior General of the Congregation of Holy Cross last summer, was designated a Council Father by the Vatican and is participating in the proceedings. A Canadian, Father Lalande is the superior of three thousand Holy Cross priests and Brothers serving on five

Monsignor Doheny and Father Heston are serving as consultants to the Council. A native of Merrill, Wisc., Monsignor Doheny is a canon law expert and a member of the Sacred Roman Rota, the highest pontifical tribunal of justice. He formerly taught legal ethics at Notre Dame. Father Heston, who is from South Bend, Ind., and also a specialist in canon law, is procurator general of the Congregation of Holy Cross in Rome. He recently was named chairman of the press panel which briefs English-speaking correspondents covering the Council on the day's proceedings. Second Vatican Council...4

Rev. Mr. Langdon, a deacon who is scheduled to be ordained to the priesthood in February, is one of a group of thirty-six student-priests and seminarians responsible for recording the verbatim text of the Council sessions. Langdon, a 1959 Notre Dame graduate whose home is in Philadelphia, Pa., took a summer course in Latin stenography, especially devised for the Council, to prepare himself for the unusual assignment. All the Council proceedings are in Latin.

Notre Dame, Ind., Dec. 3 -- A naval officer's diary on American expansion in the Pacific during the mid-nineteenth century has been edited by a University of Notre Dame historian and published by the University of Oklahoma Press.

Prof. Boleslaw Szczesniak is the editor of the new book, <u>The Opening</u> of Japan, <u>A Diary of Discovery in the Far East</u>, <u>1853-56</u>, by Rear Admiral George Henry Preble, U. S. N. It depicts the epic events which led to the opening of Japan to Western commerce by Commodore Perry.

The Preble diary, which is part of the collection of the Massachusetts Historical Society in Boston, has been reproduced for the first time in Prof. Szczesniak's book. A copy of the book will be presented to President Kennedy by Senator Robert Kerr of Oklahoma in a White House ceremony in the near future.

Preble's ship, the U. S. S. Macedonian, was second in importance to Perry's flagship and participated in all of the important activities of the

squadron including treaty negotiations, the charting of Tokyo Bay and combat with pirates in Chinese waters. Preble himself gives a unique personal survey of the first American businessmen, diplomats and missionaries in the Orient as they began to spread their influence there in the paradoxical association of religion, politics and commerce characteristic of the era. Prof. Szczesniak, a member of the Notre Dame faculty since 1949, has a special interest in Far Eastern-Western World relationships. A native of Poland, he studied at Warsaw's Oriental Institute and the University of Ottawa where he received his doctorate. At one time he was counsellor to the Polish Embassy in Japan. He is the author of <u>The Russian Revolution and Religion</u>.

Notre Dame, Ind., Dec. 12 -- The first issue of the NOTRE DAME SCIENCE QUARTERLY, a journal published by students of the College of Science, appeared here today.

J. Roberto Ramirez, a senior chemistry major from Miramar, Puerto Rico, is editor of the new publication. It is staffed by undergraduates in the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, Geology, Mathematics, Physics and Pre-Professional Studies.

Dean Frederick D. Rossini of the College of Science, in a message in the inaugural issue, stressed the important role of science in the daily lives of all our people.

"Science has become so intimately and irretrievably connected with the social and political structure of our society that few national decisions of government can now be made without sound scientific considerations," he

said.

The December issue of the NOTRE DAME SCIENCE QUARTERLY features articles on a variety of scientific subjects including "Gravity: Force or Fiction", "The Thyroid Hormone", "The Earth's Atmosphere in Terms of Radiative Transfer Theory" and "Scientific Thought -- Its Origin and Advancement." Notre Dame, Ind., Dec.13 -- Rev. John H. Miller, C.S.C., assistant professor of theology at the University of Notre Dame and a specialist in the liturgy, has been named associate staff editor of theology of <u>The New Catholic</u> Encyclopedia.

His appointment to the editorial post was announced today by Rev. Howard J. Kenna, C.S.C., provincial superior of the Holy Cross Fathers' Indiana Province, and Rt. Rev. Msgr. William A. McDonald, editor of the encyclopedia.

Father Miller is the author of <u>Fundamentals of the Liturgy</u>, editor of the <u>Yearbook of Liturgical Studies</u> and a member of the board of directors of the National Liturgical Conference. Earlier this year he appeared twice on the "Look Up and Live" program over the CBS Television Network in discussions of various aspects of the liturgy.

A native of New Orleans, La., Father Miller studied at Notre Dame

and received his licentiate in theology from the Athenaeum Angelicum in Rome. In 1955 he was awarded his doctorate by the Theological Faculty of Trier, Germany. While in Germany, he served as auxiliary chaplain for the Fourth Allied Tactical Air Base at Trier.

Father Miller entered the novitiate of the Congregation of Holy Cross in 1943, made his final profession of vows in 1947 and was ordained to the priesthood in Rome on December 22, 1951. He is a former faculty member at Holy Cross College, Washington D. C., and has been teaching at Notre Dame since 1960. He has written a number of articles on the liturgy for theological journals.

Notre Dame, Ind., Dec. 12 -- Coinciding with Advent and Christmastide, an exhibition of prints and illuminations depicting the saints is on view in the University of Notre Dame gallery.

Fifty-one works, representing artists from the 13th to the 17th centuries, have been loaned to the campus museum from the Lessing J. Rosenwald Collection of the National Gallery of Art, Washington, D. C. The exhibition will continue through January 20th. Gallery hours are 1 to 5 p.m. daily.

"In a way, prints and illuminations are to paintings what chamber music is to symphonies," Notre Dame curator John Howett writes in the catalogue of the exhibition. "The large scale of the latter seems to account for a greater popularity when oftentimes a finer quality can be found in many of the smaller works."

The Rosenwald Collection of prints, drawings and illuminations,

presented to the National Gallery in 1943, is considered one of the finest

in the world. The portion of the collection on view at Notre Dame includes a 13th century German illustration of the Pentecost and a print made by Callot

in 1621 depicting the martyrdom of St. Sebastian.

The four centuries marked by these two works witnessed an evolution from illuminations to prints and in the artistic treatment of the saints. These developments can be traced in the Notre Dame exhibition which also gives an insight into the mind and heart of the period.

Notre Dame, Ind., Dec. 10 -- Adlai E. Stevenson, U. S. ambassador to the United Nations, today was named recipient of the tenth annual Patriotism Award of the University of Notre Dame's senior class.

Class president Edgar C. Eck, Jr., Richmond, Va., said Stevenson will accept the award and deliver an address at the University's traditional Washington's Birthday Exercises to be held February 18th in the Stepan Center here.

Ambassador Stevenson is being honored by Notre Dame's seniors, Eck said, "for his great and enduring devotion to the cause of world peace" and "for his effectiveness in articulating American policy and principles at the United Nations."

The former Democratic presidential candidate and Illinois governor was chosen for the honor in balloting by the senior class. Previous recipients have been FBI director J. Edgar Hoover, Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, General Curtis

E. LeMay, Senator John F. Kennedy, Robert F. Kennedy, Dr. Wernher von Braun,
Vice President Richard Nixon, Admiral Hyman Rickover and comedian Bob Hope. A highlight of the Washington's Birthday Exercises is the presentation
of an American flag to the University by the senior class. The flag is blessed
and flown for the first time on the seniors' commencement day in June. Participating in the convocation will be Rev. Edmund P. Joyce, C.S.C.,

Notre Dame, Ind., Dec. 17 -- Rev. Thomas Barrosse, C.S.C., assistant professor of theology at the University of Notre Dame, and two other Scriptural scholars will discuss "Why Read the Bible?" on Northwestern University's "Your Right To Say It" program Sunday (Dec. 23rd).

The program will be aired by WGN-TV, Chicago, at 8:30 p.m. and by WPIX-TV, New York, at 11:30 p.m. The discussion also is scheduled for broadcast on WFMF, a Chicago FM station, Sunday at 10 a.m.

Others appearing on the special holiday program will be Rev. Harold Bosley of Christ Church Methodist, New York City; Rabbi Herman L. Davis, president of the Chicago Rabbinical Council; and James H. McBurney, dean of Northwestern's School of Speech who will be the moderator.

Father Barrosse was graduated from Notre Dame in 1947 and studied theology at the Gregorian University in Rome where he was ordained in 1950. He received his licentiate in Sacred Scripture from the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome in 1953 and during the following year studied in the Near East. He returned to the Institute to conduct Scriptural research from 1954 to 1956.

A native of New Orleans, La., Father Barrosse has taught regularly at Notre Dame and at Holy Cross College, a theological house of studies, in Washington, D. C. During 1961-62 he was a faculty member at the Catholic University of America. Father Barrosse is associate editor of the CATHOLIC BIBLICAL QUARTERLY and YEARBOOK OF LITURGICAL STUDIES.
