Notre Dame, Ind., May 11 -- His Eminence Dom Agnelo Cardinal Rossi, Archbishop of Sao Paulo, Brazil, will receive an honorary degree from the University of Notre Dame Tuesday (May 18th), it was announced today by Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., University president.

Father Hesburgh will confer an honorary Doctor of Laws degree on the Brazilian prelate at the annual President's Dinner to be attended by nearly one thousand members of the University faculty and administration and their wives in the North Dining Hall at 7 p.m.

As Archbishop of Sao Paulo, Cardinal Rossi heads the fourth largest diocese in the world. He is president of the Conference of Bishops of Brazil and has served as president of CLAF, the Bishops' Committee for Religious Instruction in Latin America. The 52-year-old Prince of the Church, a former university faculty member known for his ecumenical spirit, was ordained in Rome in 1937. He was consecrated Bishop of Barra do Pirai in 1956, became Archbishop of Ribeirao Preta in 1962, and in 1964 was installed as Archbishop of Sao Paulo and spiritual shepherd of more than 4,000,000 Catholics. He was created a cardinal by Pope Paul VI at a Vatican consistory February 25th, 1965.


Father Hesburgh will give the principal address at the Notre Dame dinner which traditionally honors faculty members who are being promoted, who are retiring or who are observing their 25th year of teaching on the campus.

Three retiring faculty members with a total of 87 years of service to Notre Dame will be honored guests at the dinner. They are Clarence J. Kline, professor of mathematics and veteran baseball coach, who joined the faculty in 1930; Willis D. Nutting, associate professor in the General Program of Liberal Studies, who has been teaching at Notre Dame since 1936; and Carl C. Stevason, associate professor of mechanical engineering, a faculty member since 1942.

Observing their silver anniversary on the Notre Dame faculty this year are Rev. Mark Fitzgerald, C.S.C., professor of economics and director of the University's annual Union-Management Conference; Guy McMichael, part-time associate professor of business organization and management; and Bernard Waldman, professor of physics and associate dean of the College of Science.

The names of faculty members being promoted in academic rank will be announced at the dinner by Rev. Chester A. Soleta, C.S.C., vice president for academic affairs. Delivering the invocation and benediction at the dinner will be Rev. Edmund P. Joyce, C.S.C., executive vice president, and Rev. Jerome J. Wilson, C.S.C., vice president for business affairs.

Officers of the Faculty Club in charge of arrangements for the dinner are Prof. James Kohn, department of chemical engineering, president; Dr. Robert Lordi, department of English, vice president; Major Lawrence Fisher, U.S.M.C., department of naval science, secretary; and Richard Burke, chief accountant at the University, treasurer.

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Notre Dame, Ind., May 18 -- McGeorge Bundy, Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, will deliver the commencement address at the University of Notre Dame June 6th (Sunday), it was announced here tonight by Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., University president. Bundy, who is a former dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences at Harvard University, will speak at ceremonies on the University Mall beginning at 2 p.m. (EST).

Father Hesburgh also announced that His Eminence Bernard Jan Cardinal Alfrink, Archbishop of Utrecht, The Netherlands, will preach the sermon during an outdoor Baccalaureate Mass he will celebrate for Notre Dame's graduates and their guests at 9 a.m. Cardinal Alfrink, a noted educator and Biblical scholar, has been a leader in the Second Vatican Council.

Honorary doctorates will be conferred on the White House aide, the Dutch prelate and seven other distinguished figures, Father Hesburgh disclosed. They are Sister Mary Luke, S. L., superior general of the Sisters of Loretto, Nerinx, Ky., one of the first American women observers at the edumenical council; Fred M. Hechinger, education editor of The New York Times; and Dr. Robert McAfee Brown, professor of religion, Special Programs in Humanities, Stanford University, Stanford, Calif.


Also receiving honorary degrees at Notre Dame's 120th annual commencement will be Paul F. Hellmuth, Boston attorney and alumni member of the University's Board of Lay Trustees; Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, New York, N.Y.; Richard Tucker, the Metropolitan Opera tenor, Great Neck, N.Y.; and Alfred Manessier, the French painter.

Father Hesburgh will confer approximately 1,450 undergraduate, graduate and law degrees during the afternoon ceremony. A feature of the exercises will be the presentation of the Lay Faculty Award to a professor who has rendered distinguished service to the University and the Professor Thomas Madden Award to an outstanding teacher of freshmen. Each of the awards is accompanied by an honorarium of \$750.

Bundy, a 1940 Yale graduate, was named to his White House post by the late President Kennedy. From 1953 to 1961 he was head of Harvard's arts and sciences faculty, serving concurrently as professor of government. Prior to his appointment as a Harvard lecturer in 1949, Bundy served as a political analyst for the Council on Foreign Relations of New York City, as a consultant to the Economic Cooperation Administration, and as an assistant to the late Henry L. Stimson and co-author with him of On Active Service in Peace and War. During World War II he rose from the rank of private to captain, participating in the planning as a staff officer for the invasion of Sicily and France.

Cardinal Alfrink, the first native of his predominantly Protestant village to become a priest, was ordained in the Utrecht cathedral August 15, 1924. After receiving a doctorate at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome in 1930, he was named a professor of Sacred Scripture at the archdiocesan seminary at Rijssenburg. In 1945 he was appointed professor of Bible exegesis at the Catholic University of Nijmegen where he made important contributions to the Dutch translation of the Bible. The late Pope Pius XII named him Coadjutor Archbishop of Utrecht on May 28, 1951, and he became head of the archdiocese upon the death of Cardinal de Jong in 1955. Cardinal Alfrink was created a Prince of the Church by the late Pope John XXIII at the Vatican consistory of March 28, 1960.

Notre Dame, Ind., May 17 -- The University of Notre Dame will sponsor a symposium in New York City Monday (May 24th) on "The Creative Conservation of Wealth Through Estate Planning and Its Relationship To Private Higher Education."

One hundred fifty lawyers, tax specialists, insurance executives, trust officers and others engaged in estate planning activities will attend the symposium at the Jade Room of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. Rev. John E. Walsh, C.S.C., Notre Dame vice president for public relations and development, will be the symposium moderator as well as host at a reception and dinner preceding the symposium at 6:30 p.m.

Addressing the estate planning parley will be Harold Swartz,
Assistant Commissioner of Internal Revenue -- Technical, Washington, D.C.,
and James F. Thornburg, South Bend (Ind.) attorney, estate planning specialist
and tax counsel to the Notre Dame Foundation.

Swartz has been associated with the Internal Revenue Service since 1935 and has been an assistant commissioner since 1958. He is responsible for the administration and technical direction of the Commissioner's policies and programs regarding the basic principles and rules for the application of the tax laws. His jurisdiction includes the preparation and issuance of rulings and advisory statements, regulations, tax guide material and tax forms and instructions. He has written a number of articles in the field of corporation taxes and the tax aspects of pension plans. He has also addressed numerous tax institutes as well as legal and accounting groups.

Thornburg is a partner in the South Bend law firm of Oare,
Thornburg, McGill and Deahl. A graduate of DePauw University and the
Indiana University Law School, he has contributed articles on law and
taxation to many journals and publications including Rene Wormser's

Guide to the Planning and Administration of Estates. He is a member
of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue's Advisory Group. Thornburg
is a former chairman of the tax section of the Indiana State Bar Association
and has served on various committees of the tax section of the American
Bar Association.
