Complaints have come in during the past week from five different parishes that the Notre Dame men in those parishes take no part in parish life. Four cases were cited of marraages outside of the church, several of neglecting Sunday Mass, and several of neglecting Easter Duty.

Since names were not given, it is impossible to compare the present religious attitude of these men with their attitude at school. Without such data useful conclusions cannot be drawn.

One observation suggests itself: When you leave school, your home parish will be the Catholic Church for most of you. Know your pastor. It is through him that you must keep in touch with God, because he is the custodian of the Sacraments for you. Write to him now, and call on him during the holidays. And don't tell him that you haven't received the Sacraments this Fall, because he probably knows as well as you do, that the average Notre Dame student receives Holy Communion oftener than three times a week.
