The Love of God is the source of alms-giving, as of every form of charity. Holy Communion is God's chosen means of communicating the Gift of Charity. The number of Communion during the month of May this year--thus far--is 4000, or 154, a day, more than the corresponding month last year; this is the largest increase noted in any one month this year.

The total number of Communion for the year up to and including yesterday is 282,608, a daily average of 1152. There should be 5000 more as a normal expectation before the close of the school year.
