88. Please give me a full argument for the Immaculate Conception, so that I may convin a non-Catholic.

- Ans. 1. The definition of the Church would mean nothing to a non-Catholic, but the constant tradition of the Church might carry some weight;
  - 2. Ask him if the salutation of the Angel Gabriel (recorded in his Gospel of St. Luke), "Hail, full of grace," would be strictly true if the Blessed Virgin had ever been under original sin;
  - 3. Ask him whether it would not be within the power of God, and eminently fitting that His Mother, Mary, be created in as pure a state as Eve, the mother of the race.

Remember that the Immaculate Conception means the preservation of the Blessed Virgin, from the first instant of her being, from all stain of sin, original and actual. If your friend understands it to mean the Virgin Birth of Christ (that Christ had no human father), please say so. That problem will be handled if you wish.

89. For two years I have been away from the Sacraments because I am afraid I will make a bad confession, a fear I have always known; and I haven't a proud moral record. What would you advise?

Ans. Come in for an interview, which will be as secret as confession. If at the end of that you are still afraid of making a bad confession, a Mass will be said for you. That fear can be pulled out by the roots at one sitting, and it will leave forever. It is best done by letting the priest make your confession for you -- and he can. If there's one thing a priest knows besides Theology, it's human nature.
