#### Reverence in Church.

Somebody once asked a student why he knelt up straight in church. He replied: "Because I believe in the Real Presence." A little more faith in this great mystery of our salvation would check a growing disrespect -- talking and laughing on entering and leaving the Divine Presence, whether in the church in the church or hall chapels. For a man of faith, conscience conscience is the best prefect.

#### Thanksgiving.

The great Gift you have received in Holy Communion demands a thanksgiving; the decree on Daily Communion describes this as being "according to each one's strength, circumstances and duties." Theologians argue that one should not leave the Divine Presence until after the Host is dissolved, which ordinarily takes from five to ten minutes. These are moments of great graces, and should be dedicated exclusively to ardent prayer. If urgent duty calls, and one must leave the chapel before such an interval has elapsed, he should at least remain recollected and avoid idle talk. Disrespect to the Blessed Sacrament, and neglect of the duty of thanksgiving, lead inevitably to loss of fervor.
