The fact that he is alive in spite of doctors' verdicts that he has no right to live, and the inch-by-inch improvements that he has had in those long years, are all attributed to prayer. He is a special friend of the Little Flower, and while we have had no word from him since last spring, we take it for granted that he will travel to her Detroit shrine in his ambulance these next nine days to make the Novena in her honor, to ask her for another "rose."

Yesterday you heard of the football team's offering of bumps for Eddie Collins. Today the proposal is made that you offer some bunk fatigue for Van. Hake the sacrifice of getting up early in the morning, and offer it for Van's improvement. It would seem from appearances at times that some of the present generation of students would like to spend about five years in bed -- but the thing doesn't seem too rosy in practice. Make this mortification for Van and you will have done something worth while this year.

Ask Advice.

Incoming freshmen often have serious spiritual problems confronting them.
