Mission Sunday.

The Catholic world, by command of His Holiness, Pope Pius XI, celebrates Mission Sunday on the third Sunday of October each year. For a fitting commemoration of this day this year, we are fortunate enough to have as our guest Father Brooks, who has shown himself one of the ablest Missionaries of our time. Be prepared to help him in two ways:

1. Put more than a penny in the collection Sunday (there were 246 last Sunday);

Confirmation at Notre Dame.

The Rt. Rev. Bishop of Fort Wayne will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation at Notre Dame on Saturday, November 1 - two weeks from tomorrow. All students who have not yet received this Sacrament are urged to hand their names to the Prefect of Religion at the earliest possible moment, and then watch the Bulletin for notice of the instruction class which should precede the reception of this Sacrament. The class will probably number 25, and no student should hesitate to hand in his name. He has an obligation under pain of mortal sin to receive the Sacrament.

Non-Catholics, Attention.

In the preparation of the mailing list for sending the Religious Bulletin to off-campus students, the names of all non-Catholics have been omitted. If any of them wish to receive the Bulletin daily, they should leave their names and addresses with the Prefect of Religion. They are entirely welcome to the Bulletin, but there is no intention to force it on their attention.
