The Saturday Masses.

The Masses tomorrow, the Feast of All Saints, will be at the same hours as on Sundays, 6:00, 7:00, 8:00 and 9:00. Please note that on holydays of obligation there are not, as a rule, any Masses in South Bend after 9:00; we have heard of no exception to the rule for tomorrow.

Confirmation.

The Rt. Rev. John F. Noll, D.D., Bishop of Fort Wayne, will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation at the 9:00 Mass tomorrow.

All Souls' Day.

The Commemoration of all the Faithful Departed, or All Souls' Day, is transferred to November 3 this year because the second falls on Sunday. Our duty to the Poor Souls demands that we aid them with prayers and indulgences. On All Souls' Day we are particularly reminded of this duty, as we are throughout the month of November, which the Church dedicates to them.

Try to hear three Masses Monday. Priests have the privilege of saying three Masses, and the faithful should try to hear that many for the benefit of their deceased relatives and friends.

Offer indulgenced visits for the Poor Souls. From Sunday noon till Monday evening you may gain a plenary indulgence for every visit you make to the church (saying six Our Fathers and Hail Marys for the intentions of the Holy Father) provided you have received Holy Communion on Sunday or Monday.

Hand in the names of those for whom you wish the prayers of the students. These names may be left at the pamphlet rack in Sorin Hall. A Mass will be offered Monday for all those whose names are thus handed in; the envelopes will then be placed on the altar and your friends will be remembered in all the Masses said in Sorin Hall during the month of November.

Don't Forget The Team.

Bulletins of the past few days have reminded you that you have been very neglectful of the football team this fall. Tomorrow is a great feast of the Church; you will all want to receive Holy Communion: give the team a remembrance in your Communion.
