A great many questions that have been asked of late can be answered by the publication of statistics showing the number of Holy Communions during October along with a few comparative figures. The calendar for the month is as follows:

The total for the year thus far is 63,820. The total for the same period last year (making allowance for the fact that school began a week later this year) was 61,902. The total gain this year is, therefore, 1918. That much gain has accumulated, however, only because during the corresponding period a year ago there was a student trip to Chicago which cost approximately 2700 Holy Communions.

Monday continues to be the problem. Why is there a falling-off of approximately 400 Communions every morning? We will be glad to hear from 400 students who have received on Sunday and not on Monday the reason for their individual failure to continue what they had begun so well.

Daily averages in the hall chapels vary from 26 in Badin Hall to 103 in Freshman; the Sorin chapel, with its average of 263, includes a najority of off-campus students along with representatives from all the halls. On a percentage basis, the following halls show a gain over October of last year: Sophomore, 39%; Walsh, 30%; St. Edward's, 13%; Howard, 12%; Freshman, 10%; Morrissey, 8%. Losses were registered by Badin (30%); Lyons (19%); and Corby (18%). The gain in St. Edward's Hall is offset somewhat, however; the hall was not completely furnished and organized until some two months after the opening of school last year.
