A Favor Was Asked Of St. Edward's Hall.

In preparation for the common fulfillment of the Easter Duty last Saturday, you were all asked a favor - that you receive Holy Communion in your hall chapel that morning. The response was very gratifying in most instances. In Badin Hall, all but nine of the Catholic students received Holy Communion. In other halls there were very good showings, and there was evidence of an excellent spirit of cooperation. St. Edward's Hall proved to be the exception. Out of almost 200 Catholic students in the hall, only 57 received Holy Communion in the hall chapel.

This particular inconvenience was asked by virtue of the fact that the Prefect of Religion places himself at your disposition for late reception of Holy Communion every other morning during the school year. Hore students from St. Edward's than from any other hall on the campus have made use of these facilities in the Sorin chapel; and fewer of them responded when they were asked to make a slight return.

Their attention is called to this merely because it represents a little kink in their character - something to be straightened out.

The Record of Easter Duties.

Holy curiosity has been asking questions. Here are the answers:

The number of Holy Communions last Saturday morning was 1900 even. The number of Easter duties was quite large, but no record was made of the number. Arranged according to halls, the number of students who have not been noticed at Holy Communion since the first Sunday in Lent is as follows:

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Since the Easter Duty season is only two weeks old, the number is gratifyingly small. It is certain that some of the lists contain names of students who have received the Sacraments during those two weeks; many of these will be removed within the week.
