The Bulletin's Position on War.

Please don't expect the <u>Bulletin</u> to take sides in the war controversy. And there certainly is a controversy. There is no definite "Catholic Position", on our participation or non-participation. The public disagreement of two members of the American hierarchy this summer shows that there is no clear "Catholic Position".

If you wish opinions of various Catholics on the controversy read the Catholic books, newspapers and magazines. Such reading is absolutely necessary today to be informed on this and other subjects of immense importance to you. The editors and writers for Catholic magazines and newspapers are experts in their field.

No Controversy on This

There can be no controversy, however, on this more fundamental point concerning our government and country. GOD AND RELIGION ARE NECESSARY in our government, laws and public life. Our country was founded on a belief in God, in His Providence and in the natural law and God-given rights.

In the Declaration of Independence are four very definite allusions to Almighty God by its framers. Read the Declaration of Independence and you will see that the writers referred to and relied on:

1. Nature and nature's God.

2. The fact that men are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights. 3. An appeal to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of their intentions. 4. A prayer for protection by Divine Providence.

You will hear many speakers refer to the "American Way", "Faith in Democracy", "The American Way of Life", "Necessity of an intense devotion to democracy". Those phrases are mere slogans and can be utterly meaningless unless you go to the foundation of American Democracy which is God, man's rights and duties toward God and each other.
