## A Soldier's Devotion To Rockne.

The Catholic Chaplain at Fort Lewis, Washington, Major W. J. Rogers, writes to the BULLETIN about one of his men. Students will find in the following incident an example of thoughtfulness and a complete devotion which does not hesitate to express itself in sacrifice.

"Dear Father: An incident happened the other day in my life which made quite an impression on me, an incident which I know the University of Our Lady would appreciate.

"After one of my Sunday Masses in Fort Lewis, a rough-looking soldier came into the sacristy and with the soldier's expressions asked me if I could say a Mass for him on March 31. I asked what the intention was.

"'Fodder,' he said, the "Rock" is dead twelve years that day and I always try to have a Mass on his anniversary.

"Immediately I asked him if he was an alumnus, the answer being: 'No, just a follower of Knute and Notre Dame.'

"To me that is a credit for Our Lady's school. It shows how Her spirit has infiltrated not only into the students themselves, but also into the 'synthetic' alumni.

"Needless to say this man came to Mass, a rainy morning, and he travelled at least a mile to be at the 6:30 Mass.

"Father, I don't know whether or not this note will be of interest to you, but to me it was most impressive. This fellow has the stuff; needless to say, Our Lady will be on his side."
