When Mr. Neeson was a student he organized the first Philadelphia Club on the campus. So it is fitting that the Club lead the way in showing the students now they can keep the day. The members of the Philadelphia Club have all the deceased alumni and former students in mind, and they are going to assist at Mass and receive Holy Communion in Sorin hall chapel Monday for these men.

Every student should follow this example and hear Mass and receive Holy Communion Monday for one another and for all living and deceased Notre Dame men.
