## Five Points About the Rosary

- 1. The indulgences attached to a specially blessed resary are obtained by the person who uses the beads, whether he is owner of them or not. All the resaries obtained from the pamphlet room in Dillon hall or from the Prefect of Religion have rich indulgences attached to them.
- 2. "What you shall ask through my rosary you shall obtain" -- this is the promise Our Lady has made to us. So whether it is a virtue you need, or a temporal favor, like help in your studies, or the removal of some cross, say the rosary with confidence and you will be heard.
- 3. If you recite the rosary before the Blessed Sacrament in any church or chapel, and reflect on the mysteries, you gain a plenary indulgence for yourself. If you wish, you may transfer this plenary indulgence to some soul in Purgatory of your own choice, or you may leave the selection to Our Lady.
- 4. The loss of a bead or two from your resary does not cause a loss of the indulgenced blessing. If you are not sure your resary has been indulgenced, see the Prefect of Peligion, who has special faculties.
- 5. What are your thoughts when you recite the first three Hail Marys after the Apostle's Creed? A fruitful practice is to make those beads a prayer for greater Faith, Hope and Charity.

## Another Student Death.

Details about the death of Bill Brady of Badin hall have just come in. Bill died at home, Brooklyn, N.Y., of cancer following an operation, on the Tuesday before the last day of final examinations in May. It was too late to make a campuswide announcement of his death. The men in Badin, however, sent a Spiritual Bouquet to Bill's family, and sang a Pequiem Mass for him on the last day of school. Bill came to Notre Dame in November of '45 and lived in 348 Badin all while he was here. During the war he was in the Navy and served in the Pacific.

## No Trick to It

Approach the cassock like you do an overcoat, and the surplice like you do your sport shirt. Everything ties in front.
