



Round Up The Stray Sheep.

Christ made it very clear that we are to be our brother's keeper. So if you know some student who needs a little encouragement in returning to Confession and Holy Communion, do what you can to bring him back.

A suggestion suffices in most cases. With some you will need to say an extra prayer and to make some sacrifice before they awaken to their indifference. But a soul is worth saving, and there will be a blessing for you as a reward for your apostolic efforts.

How To Make The Stations Of The Cross.

1. No prayers of any description need be said before beginning the Stations. However, it is profitable to spend a few moments in dispelling worldly business from your mind and in centering your thoughts on the scenes you are about to witness. An act of contrition is an aid towards this preliminary preparation of the mind and heart.
2. Meditate for a half minute or so at each of the fourteen Stations. Look at the picture or carving depicting the scene of the particular Station and holy thoughts and recollections will come.
3. Walk from Station to Station. You need not use a book of any kind, a rosary, nor say formal prayers before or after each meditation, nor genuflect on arriving at the Station, nor kneel during your reflections. The essence of this devotion is meditation of the Passion of Our Blessed Lord. You may add traditional formulas and prayers, but there is no necessity for doing so.
4. After the Stations, no prayers need be said. The Indulgences for the Way of the Cross are gained without concluding prayers. You can make the Stations with devotion in less than fifteen minutes. No student is so rushed with work that he cannot make the Stations once a week during Lent.
5. If you prefer to use a book as an aid to your reflections during the Way of the Cross, you will find special prayers in the back of the Sunday Missal.
