

Juliana lay dying in her convent. Someone came to her and asked if there was anything she wished done to give her comfort. She longed to receive Holy Communion before death, and so she asked the priest to come with the Eucharist.

Her confessor came to the sickroom and told Juliana that her request could not be fulfilled because of a stomach and throat condition that might be the cause of some irreverence to the Blessed Sacrament. Juliana then asked that the Host be brought to her so that she might adore Christ veiled beneath the Sacred Species. This her confessor agreed to do.

A corporal was brought and placed on Juliana's breast, and a Communion Host was placed on the white cloth. Suddenly the Host disappeared. No one knew what became of It until after Juliana's death when her body was being prepared for burial. It was then discovered that on her breast there was a small image of a cross, such as had been on the Host. The Host had entered her body in this miraculous manner.

A lesson can be learned from this incident in the life of St. Juliana. It is this: that Our Blessed Lord earnestly desires to come to us in Holy Communion. He wants to be received in Holy Communion so that He can help the recipient's soul. He wants to come to us more than we want Him to enter into us to do His supernatural work. When you miss an opportunity to receive Christ in Holy Communion, remember that you disappoint Him, besides depriving yourself of the blessings He would bring to you.
