A Saint For The Intemperate.

Matt Talbet was born in Dublin on May 2, 1856. In early life he became a victim of alcoholic intemperance, but reformed and thereafter spent his days in the service of God.

Matt earned his living as a laborer in a Dublin tinker yard, exercising a remarkable influence over his workmates and even among persons of high station. The secret of his sanctity was revealed by his sudden death on the streets of Dublin on June 7, 1925.

On being brought to a hospital, he was found to have had a chain tied twice around his body. Around one arm was a lighter chain; around the other arm the cord of St. Francis; around one leg a chain similar to that which was around his arm; and around the other leg a rope tied tightly. Inquiry disclosed a remarkable story of a life of austerity and sanctity.
