The End of the World.

"Take Heed To Yourselves, Lest Your Hearts Be Overburdened With Self-indulgence And Drunkenness And The Cares Of This Life, And That Day Come Upon You Suddenly."

Take care that no one leads you astray. For many will come in my name, saying, 'I am the Christ,' and, 'The time is at hand;' and they will lead many astray. Do not, therefore, go after them.

But when you hear of wars and rumors of wars, and insurrections, do not be alarmed; they must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; and there will be earthquakes in various places, and pestilences and famines, and there will be terrors and great signs from heaven. But all these things are the beginning of sorrows.

You will be delivered up by your parents and brothers and relatives and friends; and some of you they will put to death. And you will be hated by all for my name's sake; yet not a hair of your head shall perish. By your patience you will win your souls. And then many will fall away, and will betray one another, and will hate one another. And brother will hand over brother to death, and the father his child; children will rise against parents and put them to death.

And many false prophets will arise, and will lead many astray. And because iniquity will abound, the <u>charity of the many will grow cold</u>. But whoever perseveres to the end, he shall be saved. And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in the whole world, for a witness to all nations; and then will come the end.

For these are days of vengence, that all things that are written may be fulfilled. For in those days will be tribulations, such as have not been from the beginning of the creation which God created until now, nor will be.

For there will be great distress over the land, and wrath upon this people. And they will fall by the edge of the sword, and will be led away as captives to all the nations. And unless the Lord had shortened the days, no living creature would be saved.

But immediately after the tribulation of those days, there will be signs in the sun and moon and stars. The sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give her light, and the stars of heaven will be falling, and upon the earth distress of nations be-
