Leavened or unleavened bread, communion under one or both species, differences of tongue, liturgical action or chant, do not detract from identity of faith. They are norms and disciplinary prescriptions, not dogma. -- Archbishop Cicognani.

Masses Sunday will be as scheduled: 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 o'clock. THIS WILL BE DAY-LIGHT SAVING TIME. So set your watches, alarm clocks ahead <u>one hour</u>. Daylight Saving Time begins officially at 2 a.m. Sunday morning.

Each year the question is asked about the Eucharistic fast. You may follow Standard Time or Daylight Saving Time. If you follow Standard Time for the fast, you may eat or drink until 1 o'clock Daylight Saving Time. This does not hold true when the place where you are is not on Daylight Saving Time. Nor does it hold true during the other days of the school year when we (at Notre Dame) are not on Daylight Saving Time.
