The Rogation Days

If you awoke early this morning to the chanting of the Litany of the Saints floating across the lake, you probably caught your breath for a moment, thinking, perhaps, it was the Day of Judgment. It was only the "monks" up bright and early, marching along the path through the woods that leads to Calvary, praying for a bountiful harvest. Why? Because today, tomorrow, and Wednesday are Rogation Days.

The custom goes back to ancient times -- to St. Mamertus, Bishop of Vienna, and later ordered by the fifth Council of Orleans (511). These days were highly esteemed in England, even in the time of King Alfred, and continued down through Elizabeth's reign (1571). They were known in England as "Gang Days," or "Cross Week." In the Ages of Faith, people found time to petition God on these occasions for bountiful harvests; and that His Providence might watch over them, and their material needs.

You have heard of the circus pausing for a blessing before setting out on its spring tour; and of the fishing fleets and crews asking God's benediction on their labors. In Catholic countries there still flourishes this custom of the parish priest, accompanied by the people, moving with prayer and Faith through the neighboring fields, asking God's blessing on their labors and on the crops to come. In our day, only the hardy monks continue the holy custom in the locality. But it should not be above you to get down on your knees before God from Whom all blessings flow, and pray for our material welfare, especially for the breadwinners of our own families.

Our Lord made that very clear, and He promised great rewards to you for rounding up the strays -- He would forget all about your many sins! Get busy. Maybe a word from you will do the job.
