The 8 o'clock Mass in Sacred Heart Church, this Sunday, will be offered by Most Reverend Leo F. Pursley, Bishop of Fort Wayne, who will also deliver the sermon. The pews off the middle aisle will be reserved for the Pan-American delegates who meet on campus this weekend.

Only Seniors are permitted to attend Mass in their halls on Sunday mornings. Mass is offered at 10 o'clock, with a sermon and a collection. All other students are directed to Sacred Heart Church. The idea behind the regulation is this: get used to getting out of the house on Sunday morning and going to your parish church. All week in the chapels we come and go as we wish. But on Sunday we are obligated to a full Mass. You are expected to dress as becomes the occasion -- your Sunday best. The dignity of the occasion warrants it!

For Sunday entertainment, this week, we recommend highly the Loyola Community Theatre Players who will present "The Show-Off" at 3 o'clock (50ϕ) and at 8 o'clock (\$1.50) in the John Adams Auditorium (South Twyckenham Drive). It's a benefit sponsored by the Lay Family of Holy Cross for the seminarians, and just enough to take the dullness out of a South Bend Sunday afternoon. Tickets will be on sale at the door.

The Bengal Bouts are coming up next week -- another fine campus activity and entertainment. Hence, don't "pass the buck" -- give it for the Notre Dame men in Bengal. Let it be the buck you would have spent in town on other entertainment. Whether or not you have time for the bouts, you most certainly have time for this charity. Almsgiving, you know, is a form of charity; and charity is an approved form of penance and can be used to cover a multitude of our shortcomings.
