In White Plains, N.Y., a motion for an injunction to bar a civic group from erecting a Christmas Crib on the public high school lawn was denied. The objection: a crib there constitutes a violation of the principle of separation of Church and State. The judge ruled: "It is not necessary that the State be stripped of all religious sentiment, or the eradication of all vestige of the Creator's existence."

But out in Sierra Madre, Calif., fuzzy thinking prevailed -- with the result that Christmas plays were banned in the schools! Thus, the land of the Mission Padres, whose villages were largely named after the saints -- whose post offices sound like a litary -- now deprives the younger generation from portraying the story of Christmas. Hereafter, we'll think of the community largely in terms of oranges and lemons -- especially lemons!

In Dunn, N.C., radio station WCKB banned all religious Christmas carols sung by Elvis Presley. Reason: it doesn't seem to be in good taste to have him singing such religious recordings.

In Bethlehem, Pa., twenty churches, Catholic and otherwise, entered floats in the first city-wide Christmas parade. The parade was devoted entirely to stressing the religious significance of Christmas. It was sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Hymns and carols were rendered by choral groups and brass choirs along the line of march.

In Deleware Township, N.J., the board of education rescinded its recent order forbidding the presentation in public schools of Christmas pageants which depict the Nativity story. The board maintained that people may not use tax-supported school property to aid religious groups to propagate their Faith. Parents and ministers countered: "It's an established historical fact, and part of the teaching of history."
