

WEDNESDAY MORNING, you will run into a few of your friends you haven't seen so early in the morning since a year ago. And undoubtedly they will bear the same mark as you—a cross of ashes. It is the intention of the Church that this cross imprint indelibly upon our minds and hearts those words of Almighty God, "Remember, man, thou art dust and unto dust shalt thou return".

Be sure that when you wash your face you don't wash away the remembrance of your origin or lose sight of your eternal destiny. The body you shower and take such care of will eventually decay, and return to the earth from which it came. How could the Church better prepare us for the great work of Lent than by tracing on our foreheads the sign of the cross in ashes?

ASH WEDNESDAY is only the first day of this holy season of warfare. Throughout the forty days we must concentrate on our origin and destiny. Kneeling before the altar to receive ashes, we make a public act of humiliation. Let's hope that so humbled, we might better see the seriousness of our crimes and our ingratitude as

we have never seen them before. This should prompt us to desire to do penance and live up to the spirit of Lent-not for just a week or two-but, throughout the entire forty days. The fulfillment of our plans for penance and sacrifice will lead to a more perfect love of God. But this is simply to say that a Lent well-spent will be like a long retreat, and out of it will come a deeper appreciation of the purpose for which we were born into the world and just where we are heading both in time and eternity.

LENT IS a time for taking account of ourselves—as we appear before God. Take a long draw on that cigarette, sit back and reflect. Search your soul. How does it appear before God?

SURELY, if God is generous towards those who make even a slight effort during these days of public penance, it is likely, too, that He is severe with those who spend these days carelessly and indifferently.

IN SHORT, whatever your taste in haircuts, you're due to be scalped if you make the mistake of abusing the graces given you during Lent.
