SOLEMN OPENING OF MAY DEVOTIONS TOMORROW NIGHT AT 7:30. CANDLE-LIGHT PROCESSION TO THE GROTTO BEGINS AT 7:15. The hall spiritual commissioners will organize the procession in their respective halls. At 7:20, all groups should be advancing toward the Grotto, reciting the Rosary. The procession should move over the following routes. On the east side of the campus, CAVANAUGH should lead, followed by BREEN-PHILLIPS, and proceed past the front of the Administration Building, circle the rear of the church and enter the Grotto by the wide steps nearest the church. ST. EDWARD'S, followed by ZAHM and FARLEY, should proceed along the north side of the Administration Building, straight to the north steps leading into the Grotto. STANFORD and KEENAN residents will proceed north, and follow the lake road to the Grotto. On the south side of the campus, SORIN will lead, followed by WALSH, ALUMNI, and DILLON, and proceed north to the church, then west on the road that passes in front of Corby Hall and into the Grotto. On the west side of the campus, MORRISSEY and LYONS will pass under the Lyons arch and move along the lake road to the Grotto. HOWARD will be followed by BADIN, FISHER, and PANGBORN, proceeding north along the walk in front of the library and down to the Grotto. On arrival at the Grotto, move in close to the Grotto, and remain standing throughout the ceremony. Upon leaving the Grotto, place candle stubs in the receptacles at the exits.

THE SOLEMN OPENING of May Devotions could become just a demonstration, if we aren't careful. And demonstrations seldom do more for those attending than cause fallen arches and ruffled nerves. The devotions at the Grotto are designed to be a celebration of the glories of Mary. And a celebration affects man's soul. All things speak to the soul--

every form, every movement, every gesture. Untiringly, the soul strives to express its own innermost meaning in outer things. In its innermost being the soul says, "I am, in a way, related to all things." In every thing and in every event, the soul recognizes a likeness to its own being.

SO....tomorrow evening, as we celebrate the glories of Mary, ask yourself what the ceremonies are doing to your soul. You will hold a lighted candle in your hand. This candle--although very small-can become the expression of your soul. It can symbolize you. AS THE RAYS FROM IT fall across your hand, let all your readiness to serve God and Mary well up in you. And say to yourself, "Lord, here I stand." Or, "Mary, in this candle I stand before thee, ready to do the Will of Thy Son."

THERE BEFORE THE GROTTO, realize that your quest for the truth and for love of God must be as ardent as the flame. And recall that:

"The flame burns as a symbol of what is innermost in us, of the striving, illuminating, powerful soul....It signifies, or should signify, your soul....You must make it the symbol of your life-long turning to God....Make an effort for this. It does not come easily; but if you can get nearer to it, then after such moments of enlightened silence, you can go back among men with a quiet mind."

ABOVE IT hovers a flame. The flame is what changes it into a warm and shining light. Guardini suggests that if we focus our attention on the candle we may hear it speak. It says, "I stand where it is worthwhile standing--before God. Nothing in me yields. Nothing leans away. All is in readiness to serve."

AND, BEFORE THE CEREMONY is finished, the candle will have consumed itself in this service. Granted, the candle knows nothing of this. Granted, it has no soul. But, Guardini suggests, why not give it one? Let it be the expression of your soul. Or is that too far-fetched, too demanding? WHENEVER YOU RECALL MAY, recall the Grotto and the candle in your hand. And ask yourself if your soul is still like the flame on that candle--ever in motion, ever striving upward, ever following the air it needs.
