WHETHER THE DECORATIONS depict the feats of the Four Horsemen, the Gipper, Bucky O'Connor, or Johnny O'Brien, we'll just have to wait and see. We may be sure though that the old-timers back for the week-end will recall the half-time remarks of Rockne and some of the strategy he employed to bring out the best in his players. MAYBE SOMEONE WILL RECALL the time Rockne entered the dressing room at half-time, stood silent for a minute, then began to shout: "I'm through. My name won't be connected with yours any longer. They call you the Fighting Irish, but you're only a collection of peace-loving Swedes. Just keep it up! You'll be able to tell your grandchildren that you had the had the distinction of laying down and getting licked on this field for the first time." Rockne could adjust to just about

anything but a "don't care" attitude.

OR, MAYBE SOMEONE WILL RECALL the time Rockne, in the course of a game, shouted: "Fogarty! Fogarty, go out there! O'Brien's ripped his pants. Go out there and give him yours!"

THEY SAY THERE WAS A TIME when Rockne, in a meeting with his team, posed this problem: "Our ball, it's the fourth quarter. We're behind 10-to-7, ball on our own 45-yard line, fourth down, three to go-what do you do?" He put the question to a third-string back by the name of Healy. The answer came back immediately: "Well, Coach, I'd slide a few yards down the bench to get a better look at the next play."
