staking fifty cents or a dollar on a parlay card than there is in using the same amount for a show or some other form of amusement. However, it becomes a sin if any of the following factors is present.





IV. RISK OF SUSPENSION. Getting caught is no sin, but it is a sin to take a risk that might jeopardize your education and will bring sorrow to your parents as well as loss to yourself. The school forbids gambling under heavy penalties because it has so many dangers for the student.
