Pay attention to the exhortation of St Paul in the Epistle. He is pointing up the virtues that are especially needed in home life. And when you approach the altar at Communion time, pray that you might follow the example of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, so that they might welcome you when you die into their heavenly home.
