

- 1. Budget your time and stick to it.

- 4. Review as you read, checking back every few pages.
- 5. Keep classroom notes short and to the point. Fill them out later.

- 7. Turn off the radio or phonograph while studying.
- 8. Make sure you have enough light.
- 9. Keep a dictionary HANDY, and use it.

- 12. Keep notes orderly, in one notebook divided by subjects.
- 13. Don't lag behind in your homework, particularly in foreign languages.
- 14. Watch for summing-up paragraphs in textbooks, and learn them thoroughly.
