EPIPHANY

The scriptures suggest that the Infant Christ was found by only two classes of people: the very simple and the very wise. The Mass tomorrow--called "Little Christmas" by some -- dramatizes vividly the coming of the Magi and shows us how we ourselves are now privileged to play their part. We, although we aren't very wise yet, are nevertheless permitted to be the Wise Men of today, bringing our gifts to the manger of the Mass that we may pay our homage to the New-born King. What a difference, though, in the ending of their story and ours. Our gifts are transformed into Something infinitely more precious than gold.
