

Let us unite! These are the words we hear at every turn these days. For some, they may be new words. But actually, they're the very essence of the Law. They're the Gospel in its simplest expression.

Let us unite, not only in Faith, not merely in obedience, but, above all, in charity.

For all to confess one same Faith and be obedient is indeed necessary. But over and above this there is need to love one another, mutually strengthen one another, and unite without selfishness.

When Our Lord was asked which was the greatest commandment, He replied that there were two of them, but that they are like one another: to love God with one's whole soul and one's neighbor as oneself. Our human relationships, then, must be reformed. They must be made similar to our relations with God. Moreover, when He described the judgment of the human race on the Day of Judgment, Christ declared that the examination of each of us will be made on our human relationships, considering them as relations with God.

Whoever is found to have loved and served his brothers will be regarded as having served Him directly. Whoever hasn't loved and served his brothers will be condemned because he has been against Him.

What more could Christ have said to unite us? And yet He did say more!

He asked that in the Church we might love one another as He has loved us. We must look to Him for the measure of love that we should practice toward one another.

And finally, in His last prayer to the Father, Christ asked for one grace above all: Charity.

If today there is need to unite, then there must also be a need for us to put the Gospel into practice on every level.

One place to begin, here and now, is in the area of uncharitable remarks about one another. Repeatedly, uncharitable remarks behind another's, back destroy the image of unity that should prevail among us.

Before we can hope to do something to unite those outside the Church with us who are members, we have to do something to eliminate the signs of a lack of unity among us.
