## The Second Vatican Council

WITH THE ANNOUNCEMENT THIS MORNING that the Second Vatican Council.will convene in Rome on October 11th of this year, the question that many are asking is "What subjects will be treated?" Actually, until the agenda is made public, we can't be sure what subjects will be treated. However, we can mention some of the topics that many persons believe will be discussed. For months, in fact from the very first announcement that was made about the Council, the press has reported that one of its aims will be to try to heal the disunity that has prevailed in the Christian world since 1054 in the East and 1517 in the West. Another topic some believe will be discussed is the precise binding power of such papal pronouncements as encyclicals.

Another allied topic might be the Church's right to defend spiritual interests when these are endangered by secular authority. Yet another area of possible discussion may be that centering around the Church's juridical structure and efforts to keep it apace with the complexities of the 60's. The Church's growth in recent years has also meant a growth in the number of problems that presently must be submitted to Rome for adjudication. Possibly, discussion could center about ways of preserving Roman solidarity and at the same time facilitate the handling of diocesan or national problems. Moreover, it is not unlikely that there will be discussion of ways of effecting a greater participation of the laity in the Church's liturgy and apostolate. Perhaps, therefore, the Council will deal with requests for use of the vernacular to a degree beyond the privileges already granted in the administration of the sacraments. Some believe there is a good possibility that the Council will discuss the restoration of the diaconate as a permanent way of life. Finally, there is good reason for expecting that Church and State relations will find a place on the agenda. The millions of Catholics behind the Iron Curtain will be given directions aimed at exposing the utter incompatibility of communism and Christianity.



SURELY, THERE WILL BE OTHER QUESTIONS and topics discussed by the 3000 prelates when they assemble for the first ecumenical council in a hundred years. And surely the prayers of all the Catholic world will aid them in their discussions.
