BEGINNING AN ACADEMIC NEW YEAR

Yesterday was academic New Year's Day -- the day of resolutions and fresh starts. For better or for worse, the past semester is history. The new semester lies ahead, full of promise.

If you didn't do as well as you could have done, or as well as you had expected to do, now is the time to find out why. And don't blame the profs. Look to yourselves. Perhaps your study habits and methods need revising; perhaps you socialized too much — in the hall, in the Student Center, across the highway, on the telephone, at Frankie's; perhaps you wrestled with problems that interfered with concentration. If you can't come to grips with the reasons for your failure or your poor showing, seek out a counsellor to help you.

If you got by -- and are satisfied though you are capable of more -- read the parable about the distribution of the talents (Matt. 25:14-31). It isn't always the servant with one talent who buries it. Even more frequently, perhaps, the servant with five buries his.

If you did well, see if you can't do better. Don't rest on your laurels. St. Paul has a word of advice for those who are overconfident: "He who thinks he stands firmly should beware of a fall." (I Cor. 10:12) There are few who couldn't do better with a little more effort.

Whatever resolutions you make -- and you should make some -- they must have as their end the perfection of your being, and this includes the spiritual as well as the intellectual. They go hand in hand. They are not two wholly distinct compartments of your life. Everyone must strive for perfection according to his state of life. Your state of life is that of students. Your spiritual growth, therefore, will bear a direct relationship to your academic effort. And the reverse might also be true -- your intellectual growth can be affected by your spiritual efforts or your spiritual condition.

If you are attending Mass and receiving Holy Communion daily, you're off the beam if you're not making the most of your opportunity for intellectual growth. Or your cumulative average may be 5.93, and if your intellectual achievements are not the means of intensifying your Christian life, you're a failure.
