Everyone seems to have survived -physically perhaps a bit worse for wear; spiritually ??? (Optimistically we hope for the best.)

One observation: at the pre-Clancy Brothers warm-up on the banks of St. Mary's Lake, a student announcer encouraged the audience, jestingly, of course, to be uninhibited "because none of the Fathers are watching." Most of the Fathers were at dinner, but one was watching -- not spying -watching at a respectable distance, but certainly within the view of anyone who looked in his direction.

Now the point is, the motive for being uninhibited "because none of the Fathers are watching" is far below the ideal we hope Notre Dame students, Christian gentlemen, are developing. "Uninhibited" can mean many things. If it means relaxed, legitimate diversion, students need not be embarrassed if the Fathers see them. If it means vulgar display or actions which if not sinful could perhaps lead to sinful excesses, a Notre Dame student, a Christian student, should refrain, not because a Father might be watching, but because it is beneath the dignity of a Christian, is unworthy of a child of God.

This little point has wide applications. Sophisticated college students may think it childish to revert to such motives for virtue as the presence of one's Guardian Angel or the omnipresence of God. "Your Guardian Angel is watching;" or "God sees you." But it is one's Christian duty to live up to the dignity conferred in Baptism. <u>De facto</u>, by the grace of God Christians are different -- we can't say essentially different, but we can say accidentally by that very important accident of God's life within us.

Now God's life within us must be made manifest. To use a popular phrase, we must become Christian witnesses. Or to use another modern expression, we must be existentially different. We as Christians establish ideals, modes of action, standards of morality. We establish; we do not slavishly follow, and adapt to, and compromise with ideals and standards set up by a pagan society.

"By this shall all men know that you are my disciples, that you have love one for another" -- love that unites, love that gives support, love that bolsters the Christian ideal, love that builds -- does not tear down -- the Christian image in each individual.

Virtue should not have to hide, to slink down to the Grotto at night, to make excuses for praying. On a Christian college campus virtue should be essential to the image -- as bermudas and sneakers are in a more superficial order.

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In Bermuda the natives don't wear bermudas to Mass. Note in Passing:
