## NOTRE DAME OBSERVANCE AT GETTYSBURG -- JUNE 29

On June 29 Notre Dame is sponsoring a centennial observance of the Battle of Gettysburg at the Eternal Light Peace Memorial (dedicated in 1938 by President Roosevelt) on the battlefield at Gettysburg.

The event will commemorate in a special way the dramatic episode in the

historic battle when the Reverend William Corby, C.S.C., chaplain of New York's "Irish Brigade", mounted a large rock and imparted general absolution to the troops, 75,000 of whom were Confederates and 97,000 Union soldiers. The episode is commemorated by identical statues of Father Corby on the Gettysburg battlefield and at Notre Dame. The statue on campus (which turned green last St. Patrick's Day) stands on a rock brought to Notre Dame from Gettysburg.

His Eminence, Francis Cardinal Spellman will speak during a Field Mass which will be celebrated by Bishop George L. Leech of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania at noon on the day of the observance. Several other prelates, including Archbishops Patrick O'Boyle of Washington and Lawrence Shehan of Baltimore will be present.

President Kennedy has designated John S. Gleason, head of the Veterans Administration and a Notre Dame alumnus, as his personal representative at the Gettysburg observance. Former President and Mrs. Eisenhower, who live nearby, have indicated plans to attend.

Immediately prior to the Field Mass, General Gleason and Mrs. Arthur Carey, a niece of Father Corby, will unveil a new plaque to be placed at the site of the Corby statue. The plaque, which is to be blessed by Bishop Vincent McCauley, C.S.C., of Fort Portal, Uganda, assisted by Father Hesburgh, reads as follows:

> REVEREND WILLIAM E. CORBY, C.S.C. Congregation of Holy Cross

This memorial depicts Father Corby, a chaplain of the Irish Brigade, giving general absolution and blessing before battle at Gettysburg, July 2, 1863.

President, University of Notre Dame 1866-72 1877-81

Notre Dame is taking special note of the Gettysburg centennial because of the total of thirteen Holy Cross priests at the time of the Civil War in the United States, eight of them served as chaplains.

The Gettysburg observance is open to the public, and Notre Dame alumni, students, and their families in the East are particularly invited.
