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
# What Do You Want Of Us, Lord? Terri Phelps




It seemed that everywhere I turned I saw the waste land modern America: people need - physical need, emotional need, spiritual need - and their numbers increasing each returned with pressing sleep-disturbing questions: What are we as Christians supposed to do? What good can we do? Is it worth it? What am I supposed to do? What does it mean to follow Christ? Why was I more puzzled than ever? And perhaps the most pressing question of all - will my questions ever be answered?




Ahis week's Gospel puts forth a question - "What do you want of us, Jesus of Nazareth?" In the first reading Moses promises a new prophet who will tell the people what God commands -- "to him you shall listen." In Mark's Gospel, Moses' promise is realized as Jesus enters the synagogue in Capernaum and begins to teach, But in that synagogue a person with an "unclean spirit" shrieks this compelling question - "What do you want of us, Jesus of Nazareth?" For him the question was redemptive; by questioning was saved.



Mes, Jesus is unmistakably the promised prophet ĊΩ we must listen. Yet like man in Capernaum, we embody that spirit that asks endlessly What do you want of us, Jesus of Nazareth? Sometimes the emphasis is on "us." Who are we that you should call us? Or more petulantly, why me? Sometimes puzzle over the "what." What should we do? How much is enough? And in wiser times we focus on the "you." Who is this God who calls us? Who are you, Jesus of Nazareth? The questions persist and we, settling for smug answers. find ourselves against each other in armed camps in His name.



Terhaps our fumbling questions likewise cannot restore waste land of contemporary urban America - and, then, perhaps they can. If we are patient enough and do not settle for glib or easy answers, our questions will The Gospel tells us redeem us. that only Christ can pull, can drag, can summon, that incessant spirited questioning from us. To him we listen for the answer, as we continue to ask -- what do you want of us. Jesus of Nazareth?
