

Remembering





Jesus had said: "Do this to remember me. "

The Eucharist is not a ceremony unto itself: meaning for us followers of Jesus only within the whole context of our history, the context of the Word of God and of the command of Jesus to break bread together in remembrance of him. Only thus can we recognize Jesus in the whole assembly gathered together to break bread and remember Jesus according to his command.

Whatever happened to the SHELTER FOR THE HOMELESS

In September a campus-wide campaign took place to find volunteers who were willing to "spend one night a week to keep someone from freezing to death on a South Bend street."





The response from the Notre Dame and St. Mary's students and staff was overwhelming. Hundreds volunteered and were trained to help run the shelter. The shelter opened its doors at Maranatha Temple on November 1st and operated under the direction of the United Religious Community for 151 days.

On April 1st the doors were closed, ending its first winter. 3,700 nights of lodging had been provided for 170 different men and women.





April 25, Mark the Evangelist

St. Mark is one of the four evangelists. (The mention of a young man in Mk. 14: 51 during the arrest of Jesus is perhaps a reference to himself). He accompanied St. Paul during his first missionary journey. According to tradition, he was closely associated with St. Peter in Rome and it was from St. Peter that he derived his Gospel. The Gospel according to St. Mark, though the shortest of all four, is full of interesting details about the life of Our Lord.
