

Anniversary

December 2nd is the fifth anniversary of the martyrdom of four American women missionaries in E1 Salvador. The deaths of Jean Donovan. Sr. Dorothy Kazel, Sr. Maura Clark and Sister Ita Ford were the out come of Christian lives lived to the fullest. Their witness of justice. of care for the poor, of a total dedication in faith to God's presence in our world has touched the lives of people throughout the United States.

God has raised these witnesses in our midst. He calls us to the same discipleship --one that will not be understood by the powerful of

our day. Sr. Melinda Roper President of the Maryknoll Sisters commented thus on the aniversary of the women's deaths: "We must be wise serpents in naming as and denouncing the evil which pervades our world. We must filled with compassion be with those for whom suffering from the lack if necessities has become a way of life. We must be moved into action which will clearly identify us with the poor...we must not fear. Let us rather filled with courage and be hope, for:"In the tender compassion of our God. the dawn from on high shall break . upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death. and to guide our feet in the way of peace.'"

My fear of death is being challenged constantly as children and old people are being shot, some cut up with machetes and bodies thrown by the road...I want to stay on now. I believe that God is present in His seeming absence."

... I stood looking down at a sixteen year old who had been killed a few hours earlier. I know a lot of kids even younger who are dead. This is a terrible time... The reasons why so many people are being killed are quite complicated -yet there are a few simple strands. One is that many people have found a meaning to live, sacrifice, and even die. And for them life had a purpose...some things hold true wherever one is-and whatever age. What I'm saying is I hope you come to find that which gives life a deep meaning for you. Something worth living for-maybe even dying for-something that energizes you, enthuses you and enables you to keep moving ahead.

El Salvador is such a beautiful country. Where else would you find roses blooming in December?






First Sunday of Advent
