

When I say these words, what comes to your mind? "ADMISSION, RECEPTION, WELCOME." Perhaps you think of your first contacts with this University as an incoming student. Perhaps you think of joining your colleagues as a new faculty member or member of the staff. ADMISSION, RECEPTION, WELCOME. These are the words the Roman Catholic Church uses to describe the process of receiving a baptized Christian into "FULL COMMUNION" with the Catholic Church.

Aha! A "convert?" Well, not really. Vatican II's Decree on Ecumenism states that "All who have been justified by faith in baptism are members of Christ's Body and have a right to be called Christian and so are correctly accepted as brothers and sisters by the children of the Catholic church." The term "convert" properly refers to one who comes from unbelief to Christian belief. Perhaps you have heard of the R.C.I.A., the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults which is the process of Christian initiation through baptism, confirmation and eucharist into the body of Christ.

What then is involved in the admission, reception, and welcome of an <u>already</u> baptized person into the Roman Catholic Church, termed "full communion?" How can we keep from confusing it with the process of Christian initia-tion?



Admission, Reception, and Welcome. By decree of Vatican II and Pope Paul IV, the "Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into Full Communion with the Catholic Church" This revised rite was revised. of 1972 avoids anything which has the appearance of triumphalism. and expresses not conversion. rather, (you guessed but it) "admission, reception, and welcome into the fullness of Catholic Communion." FULL COMMUNION is culminated in the celebration of the liturgy of the Eucharist and the reception of the Eucharist for the first time with members of the Catholic community!

It is expected that this rite take place at a Sunday Liturgy of a local church, so that the "full significance of entrance into communion" may be expressed, and so that the "whole Christian community" may express its <u>welcome</u> and unity.

UNITY - which is expressed around the table of the Lord. As St. Paul states. "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, many though we are, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf." (1 Cor. 10:17) We encounter the Lord and each other as a community in the liturgy. In addition, as a community, we struggle to express the central mystery of our faith. death and the resurrection of Jesus. "Every time, then, vou bread eat this and drink this cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes!" (1 Cor. 11:26)

Together, we continually celebrate our baptism and our ongoing journey of faith around the table of the Lord. No other community action has this capacity to express or to effect our unity in the mystery of our shared faith. Admission, Reception, and Welcome to Full Communion... Is it any wonder that it culminates in the celebration of the liturgy of the Eucharist?


