# BRIEF ENCOUNTER

LIKE TO WALK. Llike to walk the streets of New York City. It does a lot for me: Keeps me fit; supplies L me—a priest—with some of my better homily ideas; does wonders for my mental attitude.

New York is a great city for people-watching: There are so many of us. If you're depressed, you have only to walk around midtown during the lunch break, and you'll find yourself rejuvenated by the vitality of the city.

I'm a priest whose parish is in Harlem. I walk around Harlem, but I find it almost impossible to walk around Harlem for fun and recreation. It's too depressing.

I was walking the East Side recently. It's called the "fashionable East Side." It's a nice part of town. It's easy walking. Because I was on the staff of an East Side parish for six years, I know the neighborhood. I walked into Roger that day. Roger's employed on the East Side. I stopped; we talked.

stopped; we taked. "How is it up there (in Harlem)?" he asked. "We have a lot of problems." I had already gone down the wrong road with Roger. I should have been talking about "those New York Yan-kees." You can't discuss sensitive social issues with Roger. Roger's only a few branches up the evolutionary tree

"They bring it on themselves," he said with smug self-satisfaction (1 thought).

satisfaction (1 thought). The bright lights started going on and off in my head. The bells were ringing in my ears. I was pumping adrena-lin. My blood pressure was rising. I wanted to strike out at him. I should have gotten out of there. But I tried sweet reason: "If you have slavery for 250

years, and segregation for another 100, you're going to

do a lot of damage. You're going to destroy people, and some of their kids, and their kids' kids. Worst of all, peo-

ple are going to stop believing in themselves." Roger wasn't listening; he was interrupting me. I got louder, plunged on. But when I heard him say, "Do you " I turned quickly and walked away. Some want to argue? 10 yards down the street, I regained control, turned again and shouted over my shoulder: "God bless. I'll be seeing you." (I hope not.)

AKING ON Roger was a mistake. You can't get through to him. Too many prejudices. Too much condi-tioning over a lifetime. If Jesus were here in my place, He might have tried a parable. Parables make a point by telling a story or painting a picture. They have a slow fuse. They tease you into recognition. The prophets also used parables. Nathan's story of the rich man who stole the poor man's little lamb was a thunderbolt striking David the king, who had taken Uriah's wife, Bathsheba. Roger was blaming the victim. Many of us do the same

thing, without being aware we're doing it. Roger doesn't see the

larger truth. He sees the world "out there" with his own distortions, from a personality that he's been re-creating all his life. Maybe we all do the same thing, with the possible exception of an occasional Francis of Assisi.

What is "out there"? The world of "an everlasting covenant" where we are all brothers and sisters. That's the real world. And it's the only one "out there." R
