

"....Suddenly, this night Lent stops, the *Gloria* rings out, the bells fill the air with vibrant excitement, and we are stunned, as the opening prayer declares, by 'the radiance of the risen Christ.'

"Such a quick and dramatic change brings as many different reactions as there are disciples of Christ and people in church. The three gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke all seem to go their own way in the resurrection accounts. The variations are noticeable at once. Most striking of all, perhaps, is the wide range of personal responses. 'The guards grew paralyzed with fear.' The women were frightened, half-overjoyed, half fearful, on the run! And Jesus says so quietly, 'Peace!' In Mark's gospel the women fled bewildered and trembling ... [and] said nothing to anyone' Luke, similar to the other evangelists, gives the place of honor and faith to women, are 'terrified' at first but almost immediately are the first preachers of the resurrection, even to the eleven apostles. These latter, however, considered the story 'nonsense' at first!



"Evidently, happiness and holiness can be 'too good to be true.' We can spoil the finest moments of joy in ourselves and in others by our lack of faith in the goodness and generosity in others. We suspect that it is all a show or make-belief. We may doubt the motives, why others appear kind to us. We hesitate to reassure others in their efforts to improve themselves and to grow in their talents and hopes. We can destroy hopes and throw a dark mantle of gloom and fear over the future!

"Easter declares that great reversals are not only possible. They actually happen. Miracles can and do break the monotony of daily human existence - if we believe. We need also to be humble and open to change, particularly change in the lives of the poor and oppressed."
