The Heart of the Enlightened: A Book of Story Meditations

Father de Mello advises that you carry a story around in your mind and give it a chance to work. And read it with yourself in mind, not someone else!

Last fall we reviewed the first book of de Mello's "story meditations," TAKING FLIGHT. This one continues in the same vein, offering page after page of challenging stories, filled with wisdom and potential to change the person who listens carefully.

These 250 vignettes, derived from a variety of countries, cultures and religions, share spiritual truth and popular humor. Many of them will not seem "spiritual" but if you read them only for entertainment, says de Mello, that is what you get.

The late Anthony de Mello, spiritual guide, teacher and storyteller, was the gatherer, not the author, of these stories. He arranged them under broad themes of spirituality, education, authority, human nature, relationships, service and enlightenment.

Read carefully! Many have the power of insight and healing, of releasing the fears and troubles. that shackle the human spirit, of developing self-understanding which leads to enlightenment. And while you are reading, enjoy!
