Coca-Cola Gives \$2 Million to Kellogg Institute

The Helen Kellogg Institute for International Studies has received a \$2 million gift from The Coca-Cola Company for a five-year program on Latin American public policy.

The centerpiece of the new program will be a series of televised forums on challenges confronting democracy and development in Latin America. These forums, to be held twice yearly at Notre Dame beginning next spring, will take up issues such as free trade, the environment, ethics, poverty, social policies, human rights, U.S. foreign policy, and the construction of democratic institutions.

Participants will be chosen from among the Notre Dame faculty, the hemisphere's political and business leaders, and prominent figures in education and public affairs. The discussions will be moderated by a prominent chairperson jointly invited by Notre Dame and The Coca-Cola Company. Videotapes based on forum themes will be produced for distribution to television networks, educational institutions and other interested organizations throughout the hemisphere.

The program will include the publication of a series of monographs generated by the forums. These will be distributed by Kellogg and The Coca-Cola Company to universities, research institutes, government administrators, business leaders, journalists and other policymakers.

The program will provide a total of 15 four-year graduate fellowships, three to be awarded each year of the program, for study at Notre Dame. The fellowships will be awarded to candidates from all sectors of Latin American society.
