### Do You Want to Make It \$1000?

Donations from fellows who were broke last week and from off-campus students who had not been reached before brought Father Finner's Fund up past the seven hundred mark yesterday. In addition to this a couple of hundred dollars found roaming around unattached, except insofar as they were destined for Bengal, were thrown into the fund bringing the total up above nine hundred dollars.

Do you want to make it a thousand? It makes no difference to the Bulletin whether you do or not: the results of the short campaign are extremely satisfactory as it is. If you want to make up the rest of the hundred today, rounding out an even thousand, you may use the pamphlet rack again for your offerings. This is the last day of the Church Unity Octave, and it seems proper that the collection be made to cover all the eight days devoted to the conversion of the world to Christ.
