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The Death of Father O'Malley.

The Rev. Dominic O'Malley, C.S.C., Superior of the Community House at Notre Dame, died yesterday at Sacred Heart Sanitarium, Milwaukee. He was taken ill a month ago, when he suffered a slight stroke, and he was removed to the sanitarium when his condition became complicated by a high nervous tension. He suffered another stroke this week, which hastened the end.

Father O'Malley was well known to Notre Dame men of the past three decades. He won his monogram in football during his student days (1899-1903). He entered the novitiate after his graduation from the University, and completed his ecclesiastical studies in Washington. Following his ordination to the priesthood he was rector of Sorin Hall for two years, and was then appointed President of Sacred Heart College, Watertown, Wisconsin. Some ten years ago he returned to Notre Dame as rector of Corby Hall, a post he occupied until the Provincial Chapter of 1931 elected him Superior of the Community House. He continued to teach religion at the University, however, and was in the classroom regularly during the first semester of this year.

The Mass said Sunday and the Holy Communions offered "for the next one of us to die" were applied to him, since he was a member of the faculty on leave. We still have a debt of prayer for him, however. Students are asked to attend a Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul to be offered in the church at 6:25 Friday morning; those free from classes may attend his funeral at 8:00. Prayers and Holy Communions are in order. The old boys who knew him better than the present generation of students will not forget him in their prayers; your facilities for Holy Communion and Masses are better than theirs, however, and you should give him a generous share of suffrages. Let it not be said that your hearts are cold to those who devote their lives to your service.

Why Not Hear Mass Daily?

The first half of Lent started out with a good attendance at daily Mass; then came a cold snap and your good resolutions froze. The second half of Lent is here.
